Creekside Resident Spotlight Shines on – Tops and Denie Mills

*W*e began in a most rudimentary fashion; asking each other what our first names really were. There aren't too many people who strictly go by a nickname or their last name, but this is the case for "Tops" and "Denie". Even the Creekside membership directory lists their nicknames adjacent to their phone number. "Tops" first name is Myrtis and "Denie" is short for Wardene. Denie was named after her father and has always been known by an abbreviated form of his name. And "Tops" was a family nickname that he's had since forever and he doesn't know where it came from.

When asked where they met each other Tops piped up quickly, "on the street!", but Denie smiled, told the truth, and said they met at a roller skating rink in Denver in 1940. Being the shy gentleman that he is, Tops rolled right up next to Denie and asked, "What's your name?", and the rest is history. They were married in 1942, shortly after Tops signed up for the Army Air Corps and shortly before being shipped to the South Pacific for three years.

Tops recalls going to the recruiting sergeant for the Army Air Corps and being charged \$1.00 to be recruited! While he served with the Air Corps he worked with B-17 and B-24 bombers. He was in charge of "gutting" the belly of the plane, removing the bombing racks, and placing two

rows of six cameras each. As the bombers flew over countries in the South Pacific Tops would make sure the cameras were taking pictures of everything they saw. Denie said, "He took thousands of pictures and never sent me a single one."

After the War Tops worked for the railroad in Denver for a short stint and then accepted a position with the Civil Aeronautics Administration, we know it today as the FAA. Initially stationed in Oklahoma, Tops fought tooth and nail for a transfer, not that anyone can blame him; and was stunned when he was accepted for a position in Frankfurt, Germany! With three children in tow and living in housing right next to the United States Consulate, Tops and Denie loved life in Europe and had a ball! Every other week they would visit Brussels. They enjoyed the after-hours parties and social life each evening. Tops may have let it slip that it's amazing anything got done with all the good times everyone was having. Tops and Denie took advantage of their time in Europe traveling all over the continent as much as they could.

A tradition they greatly enjoyed in Europe is called "Faching". "Faching" means "party", and boy was it ever! "Faching" began at the 11th hour, of the 11th day, of the 11th month, each year and went through Easter of the next year! Whenever anyone went "faching" they would wear a mask and on "Rose Monday", the day after Easter the masks would be

put away until the next season for “faching.” Tops remembers an employee who came to work one day wearing his mask and Tops asked him, “What’s going on?” He replied he wanted to go “faching” all day. Tops said he couldn’t spare him the day but that after work Tops and Denie would go “faching” with him and his wife. Sure enough, after work was done they went to a large hall where people were dancing; Denie remembers the hall was so full of people that it was impossible to dance side to side with your partner, you simple had to dance up and down with your partner! “All of Europe was fun, all of it” is their fond memory of their time in Europe.

When seven years was up they came back to the United States, asked to return to Europe, but there was a mandatory two year waiting period before they could go overseas again. So Tops stuck it out for one year in, of all places, Oklahoma! But that was long enough! He went to the office one day and retired from the FAA that same day. He came home to Denie and said, “I’m retired!” That was in 1974 and they spent the next 20 years in a travel trailer sightseeing across the United States! They finally settled down in Washington State, built their own house in retirement, and lived there before moving to Springfield to be closer to one of their children. They loved the “outdoor atmosphere” Washington provided and all the places to go fishing.

Denie has always loved to dance. She grew up taking dance lessons and remembers dancing as a teenager, with Lawrence Welk the Emcee, at the grandest parties Denver had to offer each weekend while Lawrence Welk was in town for the winter months. Tops didn’t dance, but Denie told her family one day he would and sure enough Tops learned to love dancing when Denie was around too.

No doubt a great sense of humor has enhanced their marriage together. They’ve been married for 72 years and Tops went on about it being the hardest, most uncomfortable 72 years of his

life and Denie simply pointed her finger at him and said, “bang.” Later on Denie admitted she had been telling others they’ve been married for 74 years, but when corrected she laughed and said, “It must’ve felt like 74 years instead of 72.”

It was hard to put an end to this enjoyable conversation. Their stories and interaction were all very enjoyable. It wasn’t hard to tell that the only things they love more than Europe and the Lawrence Welk Show which they never miss for any reason, ever, is their children and each other.

Community Members recently went to the National Weather Service Building on the northwest side of Springfield. Dan Gaede, the head Meteorologist, shared many

interesting facts about how our local, regional, and global weather data is obtained. Everywhere around the world at the exact same time a weather balloon is released into the atmosphere to gather data. In Springfield our balloons are launched at 6:00am and 6:00pm. All the data is entered into a computer system and is shared globally. This helps with establishing weather patterns, fronts, hurricanes, and seasonal forecasts. Dan told us that there are regional, state, and foreign forecasts available to all meteorologists and they are able to use that data to come up with their own local forecasts. This explains why different news stations here in Springfield may have a different forecast because it depends on what models they use and how they interpret them. The tour provided an incredible amount of current information and also about how weather forecasts have changed over the years.
